ABOUT THE OPPONENT

The New England Revolution has accrued a stellar home record early in the MLS regular season, out-scoring its opponents 10-1 with a perfect 3W-0L-0T record. The Revs kicked off their home slate with a commanding 6-1 win vs. FC Cincinnati on March 15. The historic result matched the largest margin of victory in club history, and saw the club score six goals in a game for the first time in more than two decades. The win was the first for newly-appointed Head Coach Marko Mitrović, who went on to lead the Revs to back-to-back clean sheet victories at home vs. CF Montréal (3-0) on April 4 and DC United (1-0) on April 11. New England has scored 10 goals from seven different players this season, balancing an attack that has shown depth and firepower early in the season. After back-to-back road losses to start the season, Mitrović has yet to lead the Revs astray on home turf, and will look to keep the momentum going at New England's home away from home as he takes charge of his first competitive cup game on Tuesday.

ABOUT THE U.S. OPEN CUP

The U.S. Open Cup is the only competition in USA-based team sports where amateurs have the chance to play professionals in direct competition. It is the oldest active professional soccer tournament in the country and the third-longest continuously run national cup competition in the world. Conducted on a single-game, knockout basis, the tournament has crowned a champion every year since 1914, with the exception of 2020 and 2021 due to COVID-19. The first-ever Final of the tournament took place at Coats Field in Pawtucket, Rhode Island in 1914. RIFC's Round of 32 matchup on May 7, 2025 marked the first time in more than 80 years the tournament returned to the Ocean State.

RIFC IN THE CUP

Rhode Island FC advanced to the Round of 32 after earning back-to-back shutout wins in the competition for the first time. It first dispatched amateur side CD Fialense 4-0 in the First Round on March 17 before blanking regional rival Hartford Athletic 2-0 in the Second Round on April 1. RIFC scored its six goals through five different goalscorers – defenders Aldair Sanchez, Dani Rovira, Nick Scardina and CJ Williams all scored their first career RIFC goals in this year's Open Cup. Defender Hugo Bacharach and midfielder Kevin Vang also recorded their first career RIFC assists in the competition. This year's run matches RIFC's farthest run in its three U.S. Open Cup appearances. Last season, it advanced to the Round of 32 with a 2-1 win at USL League One side Portland Hearts of Pine before falling 2-1 to the New England Revolution on May 7.

PROMISE IN THE ATTACK

In RIFC's 2-0 win against Hartford, forward JJ Williams led the effort with a goal and an assist in just 30 minutes, becoming the first RIFC player to register multiple goal contributions in a single game this season. After earning an assist in Saturday's win at Lexington, Williams now leads the team with three assists across all competitions, two of which have come in his last three games. Sanchez has also come alive in that stretch, scoring his first two career goals for the club in RIFC's last three games. The second-year RIFC defender opened his account for the Ocean State club vs. Hartford, putting the homeside ahead with a powerful close-range finish just 12 minutes in. Two games later, he opened the scoring once again vs. Lexington, netting his first career USL Championship goal for RIFC with a long-range laser that rippled the top-left corner. Jojea Kwizera followed up Sanchez's effort in Lexington with his second goal of the season, before Leo Afonso tallied his first career RIFC goal in the second half to seal Saturday's 3-1 win.

FOR THE RECORDBOOKS

Rhode Island FC has faced the New England Revolution one previous time, falling 2-1 in the U.S. Open Cup Round of 32 on May 7, 2025, in its first-ever game against MLS competition. After returning to the Round of 32 for the second-straight season, and picking up back-to-back shutout wins in the competition for the first time, RIFC will get another chance to pick up its first-ever win over an MLS club and punch its ticket to the Round of 16 for the first time. Should Rhode Island FC advance past the Revolution, it would either host MLS club Orlando City SC or travel to USL League One side FC Naples.

GOALKEEPER

Vegas was written into Rhode Island FC history on November 1, 2023, when he became the first player signed to the club's roster. The Spaniard enters his fifth season in the USL Championship in 2026 and third with RIFC, after spending his first two seasons in the league with San Diego Loyal. In his first three seasons with Rhode Island FC, Vegas captained RIFC to the 2024 USL Championship Final and back-to-back appearances in the Eastern Conference Final. Known for the quality in his touch and ability to help build up from the back, Vegas went to San Diego Loyal after 11 years of professional experience in Spain, including La Liga sides Levante UD and RCD Mallorca. Vegas made his professional debut in 2011 with Antequera CF and won a La Liga 2 championship in 2017 with Levante UD.

DANI ROVIRA

DEFENDER

Signed on January 18, 2025, Rovira is a USL Championship veteran who brings defensive experience and depth to Rhode Island FC. Rovira came to the Ocean State after making 138 appearances in six seasons with Pittsburgh Riverhounds SC, scoring one goal and dishing 14 assists in nearly 7,000 minutes of action throughout his career with the 2023 Players' Shield winners. Before joining the Hounds, Rovira made 41 appearances across three collegiate seasons at Dean College (2016) and the University of Vermont (2017-2018), totaling one goal and five assists. In his youth, he spent time with the New England Revolution Academy, playing under current Rhode Island FC Head Coach and General Manager Khano Smith, as well as Assistant Coach and Director of Goalkeeping Karl Spratt.

ALDAIR SANCHEZ

DEFENDER

Sanchez signed with Rhode Island FC on February 7, 2025, after a successful start to his professional career with Sacramento Republic FC, where he made 68 appearances in two seasons across all competitions. The versatile defender helped the club to two-straight playoff appearances during his stay, including a first-place Western Conference regular season finish in 2023. In 2024, Sanchez appeared in every USL Championship game for Sacramento, making 24 starts and scoring a career-high three goals. Before his USL Championship debut, the Portland Timbers academy product spent two years playing collegiately with the University of North Carolina, registering 769 minutes in 30 appearances for the Tar Heels. He helped North Carolina reach the Second Round of the NCAA Tournament in 2021.

HUGO BACHARACH

DEFENDER

Bacharach joined Rhode Island FC on Dec. 31, 2024, after making his professional debut with Minnesota United FC during the 2024 season, where he scored one goal in 12 appearances across MLS and MLS Next Pro. Prior to his time as a professional, Bacharach played collegiately at Fairleigh Dickinson University (2020-2022) and Indiana University (2023). After collecting Northeast Conference Defender of the Year honors in his final season with Fairleigh Dickinson, the defender transferred to Indiana, where he was named to the All-Big Ten Second Team Tournament Team after helping the team to its 12th Big Ten Tournament Championship. Originally from Spain, Bacharach spent 12 years in the Spanish Academy system in his youth development years, spending a decade with Villarreal before moving to CD Castellón.

GRANT STONEMAN

DEFENDER

Stoneman enters his seventh USL Championship season in 2026, and third with Rhode Island FC, after signing with the club on November 14, 2023. In his first two seasons with the RIFC, the defender started 39 of his 49 appearances across all competitions, tallying one goal, one assist and 143 clearances in 3,378 minutes. During his first four seasons with San Diego Loyal, Stoneman started 93 games in 99 regular-season appearances, recording four goals and four assists while cementing himself into the San Diego history books as the club's all-time leader in career regular-season minutes. Before joining the USL Championship, the defender played in USL League One (Lansing Ignite FC) and USL League Two (Chicago FC United). Stoneman also played collegiate soccer at Loyola University Chicago for three seasons.

DWAYNE ATKINSON

MIDFIELDER

Atkinson signed with Rhode Island FC on Aug. 7, 2025, from Jamaican Premier League side Cavalier FC. The 23-year-old Jamaican international joined the Ocean State club after leading Cavalier FC to three JPL titles and one CONCACAF Caribbean Cup title in five seasons, scoring 50 goals in more than 130 career appearances for his hometown club. During the 2024/25 Jamaican Premier League season, Atkinson made 41 appearances across all competitions, including all five games of the club's playoff run to its second-straight Jamaican Premier League title. He scored a career-best 19 goals, including a stretch of 11 goal contributions in seven games in Cavalier FC's journey to its first-ever CONCACAF Caribbean Cup title. At the international level, Atkinson has made six appearances for the Jamaican National Team.

LEO AFONSO

FORWARD

Afonso signed with Rhode Island FC on Jan. 8, 2026, after spending the first two years of his professional career with Major League Soccer clubs Inter Miami CF and Atlanta United FC. During his rookie season with Miami in 2024, Afonso made 26 appearances across the club's first team and its MLS Next Pro side. The forward enjoyed a prolific season with Inter Miami CF II, scoring seven goals in seven appearances. He also made 19 appearances with the first team, scoring two goals and assisting one. In July 2025, Afonso joined Atlanta United FC, making four MLS appearances and two appearances in MLS Next Pro. Prior to his professional career, Afonso enjoyed a standout four-year collegiate career at the University of Virginia, where he scored 22 goals and added eight assists in 59 career appearances.

JJ WILLIAMS

FORWARD

A surprise player announcement at the inaugural Rhode Island FC Kit Reveal Party on December 4, 2023, Williams enters his eighth USL Championship season in 2025, and third with RIFC. After leading RIFC with eight goals in 2025 and 11 goals in 2024, Williams enters 2026 as Rhode Island FC's joint all-time leading scorer with 19 career goals for the Ocean State club. With 167 professional appearances to his name, including 10 in MLS and more than 11,000 minutes of action since his professional debut in 2019, Williams also spent time with Columbus Crew (2019), Birmingham Legion FC (2019-20), Atlanta United FC (2020-21), FC Tulsa (2022) and Phoenix Rising FC (2022). In total, Williams brings 47 career USL Championship goals and 26 assists into his third season with RIFC.

AGUSTÍN RODRÍGUEZ
MIDFIELDER

Known as "Pity," Rodríguez joined Rhode Island FC on Jan. 14, 2026, on loan from Argentinian Primera División side Club Atlético Lanús. He began his professional career with Lanús in 2021, going on to tally one goal and two assists in 28 appearances across five seasons with the Argentinian club. The midfielder has also featured in 32 appearances for the club's reserve side, Lanús II, where he scored five goals. In 2025, Pity scored two goals in five appearances for Lanús II and made three appearances for the first team. He spent the back half of the year on a brief loan stint with Cypriot First Division club Anorthosis Famagusta, where he made four appearances. Internationally, Pity has made six appearances for the Argentina U20 National Team.

NOAH FUSON
FORWARD

Fuson signed with Rhode Island FC on January 16, 2024, after spending two seasons with Columbus Crew 2. Through RIFC's first two seasons, Fuson ranked second with 77 appearances, third with 5,707 minutes, third with 13 goals and finished 2025 as the club's all-time assist leader with 15. He enjoyed a career-best season in his first year with RIFC in 2024, earning the league's Golden Playmaker Award after finishing the season with a league-leading 10 assists. Prior to his time in the USL Championship, Fuson was named Crew 2 Player of the Year in 2023. In his two seasons in Columbus, Fuson logged 4,392 minutes over 49 starts and 57 appearances, tallying 20 goals and nine assists. Before joining the Crew, Fuson spent the first two seasons of his career at Forward Madison FC (USL League One).

CLAY HOLSTAD
MIDFIELDER

Holstad joined Rhode Island FC by way of Columbus Crew 2 on January 12, 2024. He finished his first two USL Championship seasons as the club's all-time leader in starts (68), appearances (78) and minutes (6,102), finishing 2025 as the only RIFC player in club history to appear in all but two of the club's games across all competitions. Prior to his time in the Ocean State, the Birmingham, Alabama, native spent one season with Columbus Crew 2, where he started 19 games in 26 appearances throughout the 2023 MLS NEXT Pro season. The midfielder scored one goal and created one assist in 1,761 minutes. In five seasons at the University of Kentucky, Holstad helped lead the Wildcats to multiple NCAA Tournament appearances and was named to the Sun Belt Conference All-Tournament Team and the NCAA All-Southeast Region Second Team.

WILL MEYER
GOALKEEPER

Will Meyer signed with Rhode Island FC on February 10, 2025, and enters his second season with Rhode Island FC in 2026. His professional career began when he was selected with the 10th pick of the second round in the 2022 MLS SuperDraft by Nashville SC. After moving to the New York Red Bulls, he made his professional debut in 2023, appearing twice for Red Bulls II before transferring to New York City FC II in 2024, where he logged a career-high 702 minutes in 10 appearances for the MLS Next Pro side with two clean sheets. Prior to his time in New York, Meyer split five seasons at the University of Louisville (2017-2019) and the University of Akron (2020-2021), where he made 42 appearances and kept 17 clean sheets throughout his collegiate career.

LOGAN DORSEY
FORWARD

Dorsey joined Rhode Island FC on Feb. 25, 2026, on loan from Major League Soccer organization Minnesota United FC. Dorsey enjoyed a breakout rookie season with Minnesota's MLS Next Pro reserve side in 2025, finishing the season as MNUFC2's leading scorer with 12 goals in 22 appearances. Prior to his professional debut, Dorsey split four collegiate seasons at the University of Kentucky (2023-2024) and Gonzaga University (2021-2022), finishing each season as the program's leading scorer. In total, Dorsey netted 27 goals in four collegiate seasons, including a career-high 14 goals in 18 appearances for the University of Kentucky during his senior season in 2024, where he became the first Kentucky Wildcat in program history to record two hat tricks in a single season.

FRANK NODARSE
DEFENDER

Nodarse joined Rhode Island FC ahead of the 2024 USL Championship season after spending two seasons with Rio Grande Valley FC Toros. In two seasons with the Ocean State club, he made 65 starts in 71 appearances, scoring eight goals and assisting one in 5,609 minutes as the club's highest-scoring defender. During his time with the Toros, the Cuban native made 46 appearances and 37 starts, tallying 3,317 regular-season minutes, one goal and three assists. Nodarse's USL career began in 2020, where he split time with Fort Lauderdale CF (now Inter Miami CF II) of USL League One and Charleston Battery in 2020-21. Nodarse has international experience at the youth level, most notably playing for the Cuba Under-20 National Team during the 2018 CONCACAF Championship.

JOJEA KWIZERA
MIDFIELDER

Kwizera joined Rhode Island FC on January 4, 2024. In his first two seasons, the Rwandan international started 52 games in 64 appearances across all competitions, scoring five goals and adding eight assists in 4,649 minutes. Kwizera came to the Ocean State after two seasons with MLS side CF Montréal, where he made 12 appearances. Prior to joining the MLS side, Kwizera split his four-year collegiate career between Utah State University Eastern and Utah Valley University. In his senior campaign at Utah Valley, Kwizera scored five times and led the Western Athletic Conference in assists (11). Kwizera transferred to Utah Valley from USU Eastern, where he recorded seven goals and 11 assists in 34 appearances. On the international stage, Kwizera led RIFC with eight senior call-ups for Rwanda in 2024 and 2025.

KEVIN VANG
MIDFIELDER

Vang made Rhode Island FC history on February 20, 2024, when he not only became one of two Rhode Island natives to sign a professional contract with Rhode Island FC, but was also the first player signed out of a local Rhode Island college or university. Vang enters his third professional season, and third season with RIFC, in 2026. In his first two professional seasons, he made one start in six appearances, logging 115 minutes. Previously, in five seasons with Providence College, Vang made 83 appearances, recording four goals and nine assists in 4,877 minutes. During his youth years with the New England Revolution's academy, he earned a callup to the U.S. Soccer Youth National Team Futures Camp in 2015 and an Under-17 National Team Camp in 2016.

JAMIN GOGO PETERS

FORWARD

Gogo Peters signed with the Ocean State club on Feb. 16, 2026, after four seasons at Brown University, where he logged 12 goals and three assists. A product of the Portland Timbers academy, the Forest Grove, Oregon native enjoyed a breakout rookie season with Brown after moving to the opposite coast in 2022. In his first year, Gogo Peters led the Bears and finished fourth in the Ivy League with seven goals in 16 appearances. In four seasons, Gogo Peters was a regular in the starting lineup, totaling 43 starts in 62 appearances and logging 3,276 minutes. He started all 15 games during his senior season in 2025, scoring three goals. Prior to his time in college, Gogo Peters featured with MLS Next Pro side Portland Timbers 2 in 2022, scoring four goals before beginning his first season with Brown.

ZACHARY HERIVAUX

MIDFIELDER

Herviaux signed with Rhode Island FC on July 3, 2024, via transfer from Tampa Bay Rowdies. The 2024 USL Championship Comeback Player of the Year started 28 of his 50 appearances through his first two seasons with RIFC, tallying six goals and five assists in 2,824 minutes. Herviaux began his professional career with his hometown club and became the third homegrown signing in New England Revolution history on May 2, 2015. While making 18 career appearances for the Revolution and scoring twice from 2015 to 2019, Herviaux also spent time on loan with San Antonio FC (2017) and Birmingham (2019) before permanently making the move to the USL Championship in 2020. In his first full season with San Antonio, Herviaux tallied one assist in eight appearances before signing with Birmingham the next season.

NICK SCARDINA

DEFENDER

Scardina signed with Rhode Island FC on Jan. 9, 2026, after spending the first three seasons of his professional career with Major League Soccer organization Charlotte FC. Playing his first two seasons with Charlotte's MLS Next Pro affiliate, Crown Legacy FC, Scardina scored nine goals and dished eight assists in 43 appearances, playing a key role in the club's first-place finish in the 2023 Eastern Conference. In 2025, Scardina elevated to the first team, starting eight games in 15 MLS appearances for Charlotte FC and helping it to a fourth-place finish in the Eastern Conference. Scardina spent his youth with the Portland Timbers Academy and played four seasons of collegiate soccer at the University of Washington, where he scored 18 goals and assisted seven in 60 career appearances.

KARIFA YAO

DEFENDER

Following stops in Major League Soccer and the Canadian Premier League, Yao signed with Rhode Island FC on January 23, 2024. He finished his second season with the club in 2025 as its all-time leader in minutes played (6,037) across all competitions, ranking first all-time with 52 blocks and 327 clearances. Born in Montréal, Yao made his professional debut with MLS side Montréal Impact (now CF Montréal) on September 20, 2020, on a Homegrown contract. In 2021, Yao was loaned out to Canadian Premier League side Cavalry FC, making 56 appearances in two seasons before being selected by Vancouver Whitecaps FC in Stage 1 of the MLS Re-Entry Draft for the 2023 season. At the international level, Yao received multiple call-ups to the Canadian Under-15 and Under-17 squads.

CJ WILLIAMS
DEFENDER

Williams signed his first professional deal with Rhode Island FC on March 2, 2026, after a successful collegiate career with Boston College. In four seasons with the Eagles, Williams started 52 of his 55 career games and logged 4,332 minutes. As a senior in 2025, he led a defensive unit that kept six shutouts, going the full 90 in seven of his final eight games. Williams also contributed two goals and one assist, the most memorable of which came in Boston College's come-from-behind 2-1 win over in-state rivals Boston University on Sept. 23, 2025, when he unleashed a long-range rocket with less than three minutes remaining to kickstart a dramatic comeback win. The Valley Stream, New York native spent his youth featuring for the academies of both New York City FC and Red Bull New York.

JACOB CASTRO
GOALKEEPER

Castro signed for RIFC on Jan. 13, 2026, after spending the first three years of his professional career with MLS Next Pro club Tacoma Defiance. In three seasons with Tacoma, he made 47 appearances, logging 4,755 minutes and posting seven shutouts. Castro spent his collegiate career across two different programs, beginning at the University of Washington in 2019 before transferring to San Diego State University in 2021. He started all 17 games and made 66 saves with seven shutouts during his first season with the Aztecs in 2022, becoming the program's first goalkeeper since 2006 to be named to the All-Pac 12 First Team. During his senior season in 2023, he was named to the All Pac-12 Second Team after leading the conference with 52 saves and finishing second with a 3.1 saves-per-game average.

HAMADY DIOP
MIDFIELDER

Diop signed with Rhode Island FC on Sept. 9, 2025, following stints with Major League Soccer's Charlotte FC and San Diego FC. Diop's professional career began in 2023, when he was selected first overall in the MLS SuperDraft by Charlotte FC after a standout three-year collegiate career at Clemson University. Diop spent his first two seasons in Charlotte, splitting 15 appearances between the first team and the MLS Next Pro reserve team, Crown Legacy FC, logging two assists. After a brief loan spell with SuperLiga club Čukarički, he was selected in the 2025 MLS Expansion Draft by San Diego FC, making eight appearances for the newest MLS club. In three seasons at Clemson, Diop scored seven goals and added three assists in 42 appearances, helping The Tigers lift its third NCAA National Championship in 2021.

AMOS SHAPIRO-THOMPSON
MIDFIELDER

Shapiro-Thompson joined Rhode Island FC ahead of the 2024 season after spending his first professional season with Red Bull New York II. After recovering from a season-long injury in 2024, the 2025 Rhode Island FC Midfielder of the Year enjoyed a breakout year, making 25 starts in 34 appearances and logging 1,984 minutes, scoring one goal. In his first professional season with RBNYII in 2023, he scored one goal in 20 appearances and registered one appearance with the Red Bull New York first team. During his youth career, Shapiro-Thompson spent time abroad in Croatia and Poland before returning home to play for Boston College from 2019 to 2022, where he scored six goals and assisted five across four NCAA seasons. He started 33 games in 36 appearances in Chestnut Hill and logged a total of 2,699 career minutes.

TECHNICAL STAFF

Khano Smith was named the first Head Coach and General Manager of Rhode Island FC on March 8, 2023. Smith joined Rhode Island FC after serving four years as the first-assistant coach at Birmingham Legion FC. Before his time in Birmingham, Smith was an assistant coach for Orlando Pride of the National Women's Soccer League for three years.

Playing career

Smith started his transition from player to coach in 2015 as an assistant coach at Southern New Hampshire University. Smith brings extensive experience to the club, including an 11-year professional career playing for seven professional teams across four leagues: Carolina Dynamo, Bermuda Hogges, Real Boston Rams (USL Premier Development League), Dandy Town Hornets F.C. (Bermudian Premier Division), New England Revolution, New York Red Bulls (Major League Soccer) and Lincoln City F.C. (EFL League Two). At the international level, Smith captained the Bermuda National Team and appeared in 32 games, including 13 CONCACAF World Cup qualifiers. He tallied 10 goals across his national team career with the Gombey Warriors.

Coaching Beginnings

In December 2022, Smith was part of the sixth graduating class to complete the U.S. Soccer Federation (USSF) Pro License, finishing a 12-month journey that began in December 2021. Joining an elite group of fewer than 75 coaches to have completed the highest-level coaching license in the Confederation of North, Central America and Caribbean Association Football (CONCACAF), Smith became the first Bermudian coach to earn the prestigious accreditation. Leading all soccer operations for Rhode Island FC, Smith has assembled a deep and talented roster, and an experienced coaching staff with high standards and expectations for the 2026 USL Championship season after leading the club to back-to-back Eastern Conference Finals in its first two seasons.

On the banks of the Seekonk River, the Tidewater Landing development is a gamechanger for the city of Pawtucket and the state of Rhode Island. The multi-purpose, award-winning Centreville Bank Stadium is the anchor of the development, which will include housing, restaurants, retail stores and recreational amenities. Rhode Islanders and visitors can attend a soccer match or concert, enjoy the Riverwalk, grab a bite, or call Centreville Bank Stadium home. The world-class destination on Pawtucket's riverfront will support thousands of jobs and create millions of dollars of tax revenue.

The 10,500-seat stadium is the home pitch to Rhode Island FC. Centreville Bank Stadium is the flagship venue for sports and entertainment in Rhode Island, hosting other sporting and community events and concerts.

Centreville Bank Stadium and the Tidewater Landing development is the result of over three years of close collaboration between the state of Rhode Island, the Executive Office of Commerce, the Rhode Island House and Senate, the city of Pawtucket, the Pawtucket City Council and developer Fortuitous Partners.

The site has been vacant for nearly 50 years. After decades of industrial use dating back to 1881, the full project will be built in multiple phases on two sites totaling 25 acres on both sides of the Seekonk River.

The private investment in Tidewater Landing represents the largest investment of private capital in any development in Rhode Island in over a century.
