RECAP: New England Revolution 1, Toronto FC 2

Jack Harrison collects assist in first Revolution start; Wilson Harris opens MLS account

TORONTO (August 15, 2026) – The New England Revolution (9-7-3, 30 pts.) saw their late comeback bid fall short in a 2-1 loss to Toronto FC (4-7-8, 20 pts.) on Saturday night at BMO Field. New England outshot the hosts 25-3 and controlled 65 percent of the possession, but Toronto capitalized on their few chances and built a two-goal advantage at halftime. Revolution forward **Wilson Harris** pulled one back in the closing minutes of the contest. Winger **Jack Harrison** recorded the assist in his first start for New England, finishing the night with a team-best four shots and five key passes in his 90-minute shift.

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The Revolution started the contest on the front foot, nearly opening the scoring in the fifth minute. **Carles Gil** delivered a dangerous corner kick into the box that met the chest of **Peyton Miller**, who set himself up for an ambitious scissor-kick attempt. The Homegrown winger struck it cleanly and delivered a powerful effort on target, but it was too close to Toronto's goalkeeper, who parried the shot away.

Harrison, making his first MLS start since 2017 after logging 36 minutes in his club debut last weekend, came inches away from the breakthrough in the 18th minute. Harrison took on his defender inside the box with a quick stepover move to set up a left-footed shot. The longtime Premier League attacker showed no hesitation, unleashing a driven strike that appeared destined for the upper-left corner, but the attempt narrowly sailed over the crossbar.

Despite generating several promising chances in the opening half, Toronto scored on both of their first-half shot attempts to take a two-goal lead into the intermission. The host's opener came when Theo Corbeanu's low cross deflected off Revolution defender **Will Sands** and snuck inside **Matt Turner's** near post. Toronto newcomer Niklas Dorsch then doubled the lead moments later, blasting a rocket into the top-right corner from long range.

Harrison continued to provide a spark for New England in the second half, carving out back-to-back chances around the hour mark. In the 59th minute, **Matt Polster** found the English attacker open in the middle of the box. Harrison settled the pass and fired a shot off the woodwork. Moments later, he combined with defender **Ethan Kohler** in a quick give-and-go sequence, but his ensuing effort was blocked by a Toronto defender.

After a red card was shown to Toronto's Djordje Mihailovic for a foul from behind on Gil, the Revolution re-established offensive control and cut into the deficit in the final minute of regulation.

Center back **Mamadou Fofana** linked up with Harrison outside Toronto's 18-yard box, and Harrison delivered a floated cross into the area. Harris, a 72nd-minute substitute, climbed above his defender and powered a header into the back of the net for the first goal of his MLS career. Fofana and Harrison were both credited with assists, marking each player's first helper of the season.

The Revolution will remain on the road for a midweek match against D.C. United on Wednesday, August 19. The 7:30 p.m. ET kickoff at Audi Field will stream live on [Apple TV](#) in English and Spanish, or tune in to the club's local radio calls on 98.5 The Sports Hub (WBZ-FM) and 1260 AM Nossa Radio USA (Portuguese).

MATCH NOTES

- New England posted a season-high 25 shot attempts to Toronto's three, with a 6-1 edge in shots on frame.
- The Revolution generated 2.62 expected goals, the team's second-highest total of the season.
- **F Wilson Harris** opened his MLS account with a 90th-minute goal. Harris has logged five straight appearances off the bench since signing with New England in July.
- **F/W Jack Harrison** recorded his first Revolution assist in his first club start, playing all 90 minutes in his second appearance with New England.
- **Harrison** led the team with five key passes and four shot attempts, which tied his MLS single-game high.
- **D Mamadou Fofana** registered a secondary assist on Harris's goal, the second helper of his MLS career.
- **M Matt Polster**, starting his fifth straight match at right back, matched his career best with three shot attempts.
- **F/W Griffin Yow** replaced an injured Peyton Miller in the 40th minute tonight, marking his 50th MLS appearance.
- **D Ethan Kohler** completed 100 percent of his 85 passes in his 90-minute outing tonight.
